In December 2015, France will host COP21. The objective of this meeting is to finalize a new international agreement on a post-2020 regime. By the end of COP21, for the first time in over 20 years of UN negotiations, all nations, including the biggest emitters of greenhouse gases, both developed or developing countries, should be bound by a universal agreement on climate, applicable to all and ambitious enough to limit global warming to 2°C. French embassies throughout the world are dedicating their efforts to raise awareness on this topic, in order to ensure the achievement of COP21's goal. Concept note

The <u>Faculty of Law of the Chinese University of Hong Kong</u> and the Consulate General of France in Hong Kong & Macau organise a conference on "Sustainable Development and International Law- Current Issues and Future Challenges" that will be held on October 19, 2015. The event takes place in Admiralty, Bank of America (1st Floor), CUHK Graduate Law Campus (from 9am to 5pm) and is free.

Never before in history has international law been growing more rapidly than since the end of the Second World War. There has been a clear trend towards greater extensity, intensity and impact of global economic relations on human well-being and the welfare of people in their daily lives. While this process has existed for many years and decades ever since the great discoveries, global shipping and the technological revolution, enhanced political attention has been paid to it only during the last decade, depicted in terms of *globalisation*. This debate has many political, cultural and economic facets. Transnational access to markets (liberalization), cultural and political identity, and, even more importantly, 'sustainable development' are at the heart of the debate. The present conference provides a forum for academic and practitioners to debate the legal status of "sustainable development".

In a relatively short time the concept of "sustainable development" has become firmly established in the field of international law. The World Commission on Environment and Development originally defined sustainable development as a "development that meets the needs of the present generation without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs". This definition takes into account the needs of both the present and future generations as well as the capacity of the earth and its natural resources which by clear implication should not be depleted by a small group of people (in industrialized countries).

The aim of this conference is threefold. Its first aim is to review the genesis and clarify the meaning of the concept of sustainable development, as well as to assess its status within public international law. Its second is to examine the legal principles that have emerged in the pursuit of sustainable development. And its third is to assess to what extent the actual evolution of law demonstrates the balance and integration with all pertinent fields of international law as urged by the Rio, Johannesburg, and World Summit documents.

The conference will start with a presentation of the Tara Expedition. Tara Expeditions is a nonprofit organization active since 2003 in favor of the environment. A legendary boat built for extreme conditions, Tara is the platform for high-level scientific research missions. For 10 years Tara has been constantly on the move: The schooner has traveled 300,000 kilometers across all the world's oceans and has accomplished 10 expeditions to study and understand the impacts of climate change and the ecological crisis on the ocean, with concrete results. Features speakers also include Prof. Julien Chaisse (CUHK), Prof. Mark Feldman (Peking University), Prof. Mimi Zhou (CUHK), Mr. Vivian Desmonts (DS Avocats), Dr. Jeanne Ng (Director Group Sustainability, CLP Power Hong Kong), and Mrs. Mayling Chan (Oxfam HK).
